Last year I went to Concord to attend Putman's Gala, our sister Clubhouse. I found it hard to be around large groups of people I have never met. I felt very overwhelmed. In this year's gala with California Clubhouse, we sang on a stage for our guests and it was an awesome experience! I think I passed the test of being around a lot of people. Next time in a crowd I know I will be more confident and prepared thanks to California Clubhouse."

How California Clubhouse has changed my life! by Dave B.

Before the Clubhouse, I complained to my nurse about not having enough to do and being bored with my schedule. My nurse recommended California Clubhouse and everything changed from there.

I have had a lot of work and learning to do since attending to the Clubhouse regularly. At first, I started doing maintenance work; Cleaning, sanitizing, and organization.

Currently, I do more clerical work; track attendance, check emails, and basic accounting. This has strengthened my computer skills tremendously. My doctor has reduced my medication, and I feel much better and more alert. California Clubhouse has changed my life.

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Transitioning In and Out of Employment by Riley M. and Ann C.

Working at Walgreens, through Clubhouse's transitional employment program, has been good for me. The most immediate, straightforward benefit is earned income. Other benefits are more subtle. My life is less isolated. I've had days and weeks, in my past, with barely a spoken word exchanged with another person, but in a four hour shift as "Customer Service Associate", I chat and confer with co-workers, and greet dozens to hundreds of customers. I get

more exercise, both on my bicycle while commuting, and on the job, walking from one task to another inside the store. I've gained some status within the Clubhouse community. (Sometimes the "spotlight" I get as the first member with a T.E. job is a bit much; other members also work, and deserve as much or more recognition for doing so without placement

Here's a less obvious benefit: as a cashier, I routinely say "Have a nice day" to dozens or hundreds of customers. I mean it more often and more strongly than I had expected. So I've reconsidered: all the thousands of times that a cashier has said that to me, maybe they really meant it, more often and more strongly than I heard it. I assumed that they just following the script, but maybe I was erring of the side of pessimism. I slightly raised my baseline

estimate of how friendly people are, and thus reduced my assessment of how hostile the world is. For a person with major chronic depression, that's an important shift of perspective. –Riley

Following Riley at Walgreens will be a pleasure because he has made such a good impression while working there. To take up where he has left off with careful attention to customer service, organizing stock, and cashiering, and; to go forward with steadfast encouragement from Clubhouse will be the heart of working at Walgreens. I feel so honored to be the next Transitional Employment Employee.—Ann

On February 2nd, I celebrated one year since I first completed my orientation and began working at Goodwill. The time has flown by so fast. I enjoy my work at Goodwill. I went from sorting through clothes to being the one to hang up the clothes before they go out for sale. Hanging clothes is a better job for me, I get to see all the cool clothes that come in without having to sort through the dirty and grimy clothes. My direct supervisor is a ninety-year-old woman who still has tons of ener-

gy and is a real pleasure to work with.

It has been a good year working at Goodwill, but I think it's time to start looking towards my future goals of having a career in nursing. With the help of California Clubhouse, I want to start taking classes either in the Summer or in the Fall. The classes I would take are prerequisites for nursing and I would go to one of my local community colleges before applying to Samuel Merritt

for a two-year program that would get me my B.S. and qualify me for the RN qualification exam. I will continue to work at Goodwill while I fulfill my prerequisites, but would go to Samuel Merritt full time after being accepted. I am looking forward to continuing my work at Goodwill and then pursuing my future career. I know with the support of the Clubhouse, I know I can achieve my career goals.
